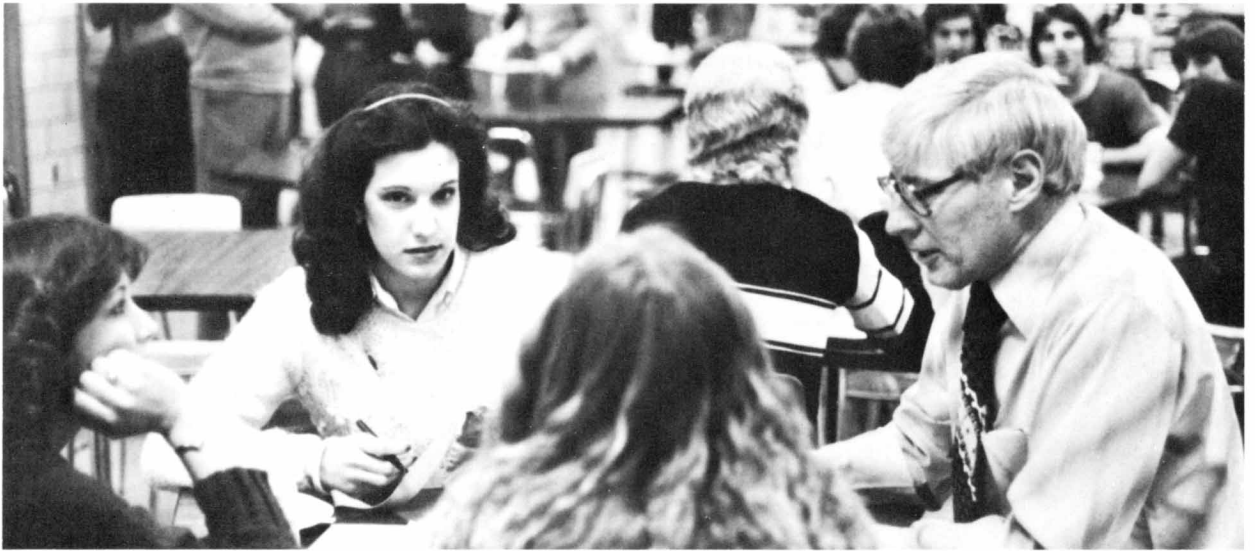
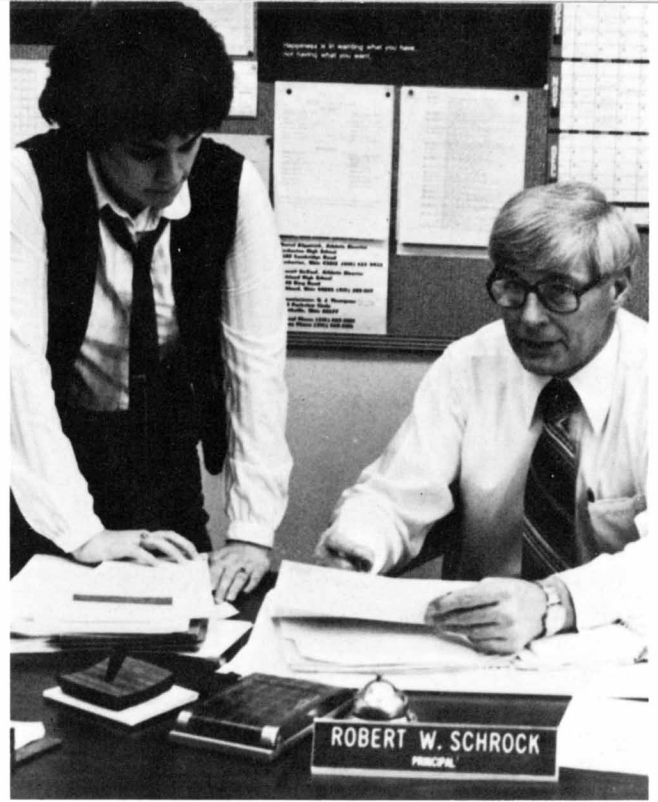


Good-bye to a Friend of D.H.S.
